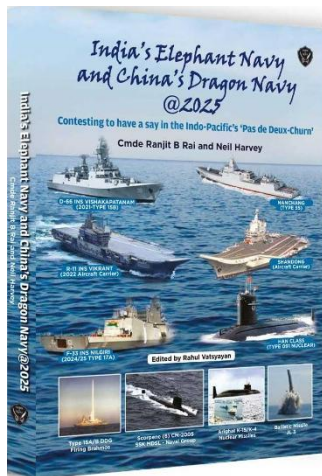

1. India's elephant navy and China's dragon navy@2025 by Ranjit B Rai



This 286-page book by Cmde Ranjit Rai and Neil Harvey is as much about India and China's fast-growing Nuclear Navies inventories in color, as it is about China, whose name is Zhōngguó and India, called Bharat.

The Chinese believe that Zhōngguó was the politico-cultural center of the world, surrounded by lesser nations. The Silk Road was China's source of wealth and a means to spread its culture through trade. Their Great Wall symbolized security. India is rising on the world stage and striving to regain its past glory through Project Hindutva, at a time when the world is witnessing unprecedented geostrategic shifts.

The centre of economic and military gravity is rapidly shifting Eastwards towards the contested Indo-Pacific. India and China, with nearly one-third of the world's population will matter, and eleven chapters allude to that.

Cmde Ranjit B Rai is the author and former DNO, DNI and current Vice President of The Indian Maritime Foundation's Delhi hapter. He curates a Maritime Museum.

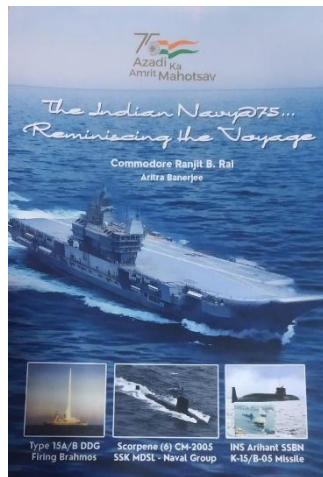
Neil Harvey, the book's co-author is a builder by profession in Bristol and enjoys spotting warships and producing pictorial books of World Navies.

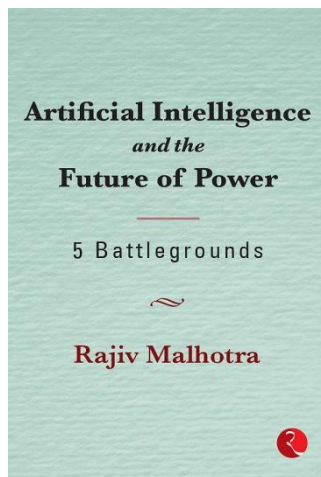

3. Artificial intelligence and the future of power 5 battlegrounds by Rajiv Malhotra



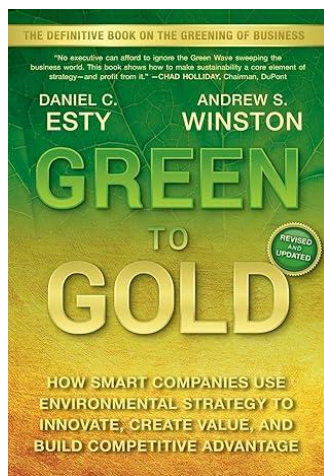

Whether you are a social media Fanatic, a diehard AI aficionado, or a paranoid sceptic, it is impossible to escape the ubiquitous impact of AI. Artificial intelligence is the brains bringing together quantum computing, nanotechnology, medical technology, brain-machine interface, robotics, aerospace, 5G, Internet of Things, and more. It is amplifying human ingenuity and disrupting the foundations of healthcare, military, entertainment, education, marketing and manufacturing. Artificial intelligence and the future of power argues that this ai-driven revolution will have an unequal impact on different segments of humanity. 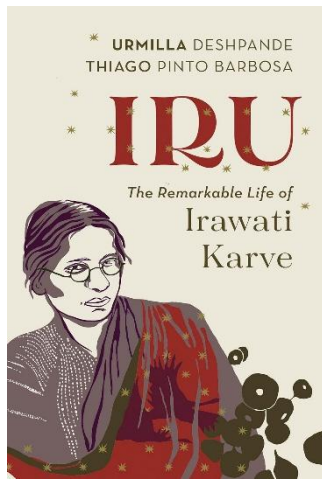

5. Iru: The remarkable life of Irawati Karve by Urmilla Deshpande



In 1927, when Irawati Karve, aged twenty-two, arrived in Berlin to do her doctoral studies at the Friedrich Wilhelm University, she was faced with a dilemma. As a woman of colour, the subject of her thesis was to prove her supervisor Dr Eugen Fischer's theory of the superiority of the European race over people of colour, based on the measurement of their skulls. After examining 149 'white' skulls from Germany and 'non-white' skulls from German colonies in East Africa, Irawati came to the opposite conclusion: the shape of the human skull did not prove racial superiority. Fischer's theory was later discredited, but at the time, it took courage to present the paper to him and it nearly cost Irawati her PhD.

Courage and a pioneering spirit continued to be her hallmarks on her return to India. At a time when such field trips were difficult if not dangerous, she travelled to the Adivasi areas in Coorg, Western Maharashtra, Assam, Kerala and Bihar. Her research resulted in two seminal works, *Kinship Organisation in India and Hindu Society*.

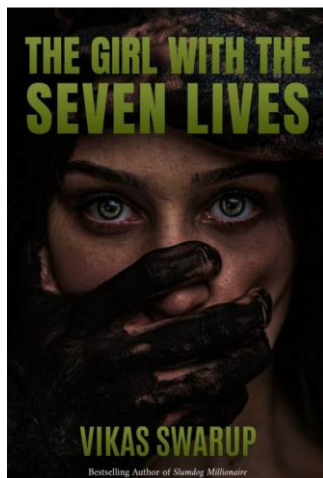
In 1968, she won the Sahitya Akademi award for her book of essays on the Mahabharata, *Yuganta*. Irawati's belief that the Mahabharata was not just an epic, but a historical record, earned her some criticism from her peers at the time, but *Yuganta* remains a classic to this day.....

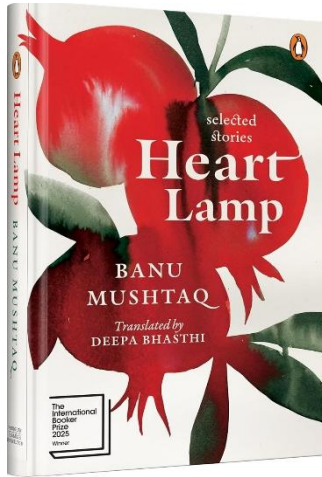

7. Heart lamp: selected stories by Banu Mushtaq



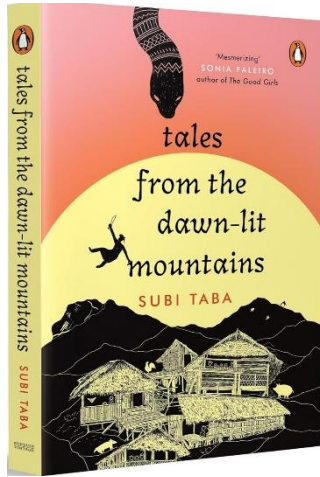

Published originally in the Kannada, these portraits of family and community tensions testify to Mushtaq's years as a journalist and lawyer, in which she tirelessly championed women's rights and protested all forms of caste and religious oppression. Written in a style at once witty, vivid, colloquial, moving and excoriating, it's in her characters – the sparky children, the audacious grandmothers, the buffoonish maulvis and thug brothers, the oft-hapless husbands, and the mothers above all, surviving their feelings at great cost – that Mushtaq emerges as an astonishing writer and observer of human nature, building disconcerting emotional heights out of a rich spoken style. Her opus has garnered both censure from conservative quarters as well India's most prestigious literary awards; this is a collection sure to be read for years to come.

A village is haunted by an insidious spirit tiger. A bee sting reminds a Nocte boy of his brother's beheading and transforms him into a deadly headhunter. A Donyi-Polo priest must continue practising his animistic rituals to preserve the fading vestiges of his indigenous religion. The curse of a high priest follows the thief who stole the forbidden sacred ornaments . . . Such evocative and poignant tales make this debut collection a must-read.
